# Cassie and Friends Puppet Show for Juvenile Arthritis

Juvenile Arthritis affects 3 in 1000 kids in Canada – making it one of the most common chronic conditions affecting children today. Even still it is still relatively unknown and often misunderstood. For kids, this can lead to feelings of embarrassment, social exclusion and even bullying – all that for a child who is already dealing with a painful and largely invisible disease. Through better information in schools and awareness by peers, children who have JA can find hope and acceptance.

Kids on the Block (KOB) show teaches kids (and educators) about friendship, inclusion and how to talk about any kind of 'difference.' The overall message is one of ability over disability – giving kids the chance to turn their focus back to being kids.

WHO ARE THE KIDS ON THE BLOCK?

KOB is a troupe of life-sized puppets that dress and act like real children. The program's goal is to help raise awareness and understanding about what it's

The puppets also help children feel positive about themselves, accept individual differences and learn valuable personal skills.
